The way that J expresses himself and their love for each other is just beyond touching. We read novels about this kind of love, but see it too infrequently in real life. I pass this on to you, not just in her memory, for like you, I do not know her, but as inspiration and a model for us all. It begins with this letter then see the attachments.

With all of my nonsense e-mails, this one is just too special to let it go with just me. It gives us all much to think about.

### **Second email**

I know that I never met your T. I am sorry about that. Many times S mentioned that we should get together because I would like her. I am sure that he is right about that. Although it is too late now, I feel that you have shown me her in spirit and for that I am grateful.

We all, I think, see ourselves as potential 007 heroes; people who would meet any challenge head on and with courage. When I first remember reading about the Holocaust I believed that I would have been a Resistance Agent. Thank God, I never got to know. When we moved to Pa full-time, S and I did, in fact, volunteer on the Fire and Rescue Squad for five years. That was our small heroism. We often send to charities and peoples in need. None of this even begins to equal your Miss T.

I cannot imagine how T kept up her sanity let alone her spirit. Even more so, I am amazed at how she left this world. There was no mention of her pain or what she felt she would be losing or missing. What she did was to prepare you and the family for being without her. She sent herself off with special spirit. Even in her last moments, she cared for others more than herself.

I am very touched by your notes and by T's grace and style. I know that she will live in your heart and thoughts forever. I hope that your pain is bearable and that you, like T, keep looking at the good things in life – forever.

I was not even looking for it – I had actually completely forgotten about it. I read it and realized all that I had written back then is still the same today.

I know this has been so hard for you since your "official" diagnosis. These past two years have been hard for those of us around you so I cannot even begin to imagine how you must feel. However, I have come to think of this time as a blessing. I would not trade the time I have gotten to spend with you for anything. I have learned so many things from you these last two years...

Without your guidance and skill I would have never learned to needlepoint. It is a hobby I have come to love. It is so soothing and calming – I will never pick up another canvas to work on without thinking of you. I treasure each piece that I have done and when I look at them I am reminded of you. So for that, let me say thank you.

Without your constant prodding I would not have learned to appreciate the beauty of bird watching. I have attempted to collect my thoughts and put them in words but the words just do not seem to express well enough how I feel about Theodora and her passing. Theodora's choice of funeral arrangements was an inspiration to me. It was exactly what you would expect from Theodora with her happy, optimistic, and joyful demeanor. I loved every thing about it, the feather boas, the balloons, the fiddler, and especially having her dog along side her. It was not easy to let T go but she wanted to make it as painless as possible. That was T, always thinking of others. Even at her funeral.

I want you and your family to know that I understand that you are going through a difficult period of sadness at the loss of Theodora. It is especially sad for me and for all of the Ferniany cousins that are of our generation. Theodora is the first cousin of our generation to pass to the

next phase of life with Christ and with all of our relatives and friends who have gone before.

My earliest memories are of my family, and my cousins, and of you too. We all lived across the street and down the block from each other as children in the 1950's. I remember when you and Theodora were starting to like one another, in high school I think it was. I remember how we were always together at holidays or any special occasion. Uncle Joe and Aunt Vivian's house was the grand central meeting place for friends, family, and neighbors. It seems there was always a full house.

I mostly remember her laughing through the entire movie, it was a Robin Williams movie, I forgot which one.

When T was diagnosed with Lew Gherig's disease, I didn't want to believe that it was really a terminal illness and I blocked it out hoping it was a mistake. Theodora came up with a plan to reunite all of her cousins by inviting us to her house for dinner on occasion. It was a wonderful way for us all to reunite and tell old stories and to feel a family connection again, like we did when Uncle Joe and Aunt Vivian were around. What a great idea that was!
